### Mask Guidance Update

With the steady decline in positive COVID-19 cases, Fridley Public Schools—like many school districts across the state and country—is constantly reviewing its COVID-19 mitigation strategies. Anoka County is currently experiencing less than 10% of the number of cases we saw in late January. The shared commitment of our community to reduce the spread has brought us to a much healthier point.

On Monday, March 7, the district instated Updated Mask Wearing **Guidelines:** 

- Masks are recommended for: All K-12 students, staff and visitors inside district buildings.
- Masks are required for: All students under the age of 5, and staff working with students in preschool and early childhood, including on school buses; and students and staff returning to school on days six through 10 following a positive test.

### **FHS** senior named National **Merit Scholarship finalist**

Congratulations to Fridley High School (FHS) senior Akshay Rai, who has been named a 2022 National Merit Scholarship finalist! This honorary distinction is earned by an aca-

demically elite group of 15,000 high school students across the United States, which places Rai in the top one percent of the nation's graduating seniors. Finalists are selected after completing a detailed scholarship application, which includes their academic record, extracurricular activities, demonstrated leadership abilities, employment, honors and awards. Rai now advances to the final phase of the competition, where 7,500 finalists are selected to earn Merit Scholarships.

### Fridley YIG student writes bill that continues to gain momentum

A breakaway star emerged from the 2022 Youth in Government (YIG) Legislative Session at the State Capitol held January 6 through January 9, 2022. Mike LeRoy, a sophomore at Fridley High School (FHS), had a bill he wrote unanimously passed by his colleagues from committee through the House and Senate floor, and signed into Minnesota YIG law by Lieutenant Governor Anneteke Adoga.

YIG delegate LeRoy's bill allows people with disabilities to get married without any financial or medical coverage penalties. There are a number of complicated laws that determine how people with disabilities receive social services once married. Currently in the United States, if people with disabilities marry, they may risk losing Social Security, medical coverage or other civil benefits.

LeRoy, who has cerebral palsy and epilepsy, utilizes a power chair and has a service dog, Maddox. He often shares his experiences to advocate for accessibility and inclusion for people with disabilities and educate the uninformed.

Steve Holt, Fridley High School's advisor for YIG, was abundantly proud of LeRoy's presence at the assembly, and how it influenced others. "Mike is breaking ground; he is a great ambassador," Holt said. "It is very inspiring to see him teach other students about people with disabilities."

The bill states that "Every person should have the ability to get married without losing money or losing their health insurance." It continues to make a case that persons with

high medical needs who marry and lose insurance coverage will end up financially broke. Continuing his momentum for the bill, LeRoy was invited to present at the virtual Minnesota Council on

Disability (MCD) conference on January 15, 2022.

There, LeRoy and his mother, Kathie, explained the rationale behind the bill. "Mike would maybe like to have kids someday, and get married," Kathie shared with those in attendance. "I explained to him the way some of that works is really complicated. He might need to reconsider getting married or not, based on the way some of the programs are currently set up in the United States to make sure people have social services support."

Trevor Turner, Public Policy Director for the MCD, told LeRoy his presentation was going to be included in the council's agenda to continue dialogue and explore next steps. As an advocate who is leading the charge of educating others, LeRoy said improvements have only just begun. "Before the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), there was no access to sidewalks and buses," he said. "We have more accessibility in the United

of Representatives.

States, but we need to keep working at it." In an exciting coincidence, a similar bill was introduced the following week in Washington, D.C. California Representative Jimmy Panetta introduced the Marriage Equality for Disabled Adults Act in the U.S. House

"It's now a bill in the U.S. House of Representatives. And that is much better in the long run," added LeRoy. "It makes me excited for the future, that I could get married without losing my disability benefits or health insurance."

LeRoy is already making plans to attend the University of Minnesota to study astronomy, physics and astrophysics after graduation.

# Freezing for Inclusion: Fridley Middle School hosts Cool School Mobile Polar Plunge



Fridley Middle School (FMS) students and staff braved frigid waters to rally around acceptance and inclusion, as the school hosted its first Special Olympics Minnesota Cool School Mobile Polar Plunge on Wednesday, December 1, 2021. A total of 277 students took the leap into the mobile "plungester" in the school's front parking lot. In addition to FMS participants, students and staff of Fridley High School's special education program had the opportunity to take the plunge.

Through fundraising by students and staff prior to the event, the school raised \$5,509 to benefit both FMS Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) and Special Olympics Minnesota. The special event also included a pep fest hosted by Special Olympics Minnesota, which featured a guest speaker, games and prizes.

The unique and fun opportunity was provided to the school because of its Unified Champion School status. As a Unified Champion School, FMS offers many opportunities to all students that promote social inclusion. This includes unified homerooms, field trips, and leadership summit opportunities for students with disabilities. The school also participates in the annual Speak Kindness and Person First campaigns, which promote acceptance and use of language that is respectful and inclusive.

According to Special Education teacher Chelsea Clark, being a Unified Champion School sends a positive and educational message to students. "Through these intentional approaches, we promote a schoolwide climate of acceptance," said Clark. "Many students don't personally know someone with a disability outside of the school setting. Through opportunities and connections, students can gain a better understanding, develop empathy and treat everyone with kindness and respect, regardless of if a student has a disability or not."

Since 2018, the FMS special education program has brought groups of students to the Polar Plunge located at Lake Bde Maka Ska in Minneapolis. Jessica Mularie, also a Special Education teacher, said bringing the Polar Plunge to FMS was more feasible for this school year and elevated schoolwide participation in the event. "We were so blown away with the support, positive energy, and students' capacity for empathy at the event," said Mularie. "We are also thankful to our administration for supporting us and always championing inclusion and unified initiatives at our school!"



This year, 13 seniors are participating in the highly rigorous college preparatory program.

To earn an IB Diploma, students must complete DP core classes, assessments and exams during their junior and/ or senior years of high school. The challenging DP pathway is a course of study that is considered a prestigious distinction on college applications and offers students the opportunity to earn college credits. The extended essay is an externally assessed, in-depth study into a topic
